The California custom auto shop was made famous by the MTV show "Pimp My Ride" (Sundays, 9 p.m.), in which West Coast Customs transforms people's old, beat-up cars into tricked-out rides. They redo the interior, adding plush upholstery, stereo systems, DVD players and other items to fit in with the personality of the car's owner. They also fix up the exterior with new paint jobs, rims, graphics, spoilers or other hot accessories. West Coast Customs also does performance upgrades to give cars more power and better handling. West Coast Customs has become so popular that one of the cars in Hot Wheels' Whips lineup is a "West Coast Customs Pontiac GTO" in 1:18 scale. "Pimp My Ride" has earned a People's Choice nomination.

Big Dane and Q are the personalities from West Coast Customs who will attend the event. They will bring at least eight of the vehicles that they've modified for display, as well as merchandise for sale, and will be available on both Saturday and Sunday, May 21-22.

"We're more than excited to come to the show," said Big Dane. "The people who come to these shows are eager to learn; they're very much into the industry. It's great for me to give a little bit of my knowledge.

"We represent the West Coast Customs flavor, and we'll showcase our real work. We'll show what really can be done under one roof," Dane added. As for the customizations they do on "Pimp My Ride," he said, "That's like our junior high level of work compared to what we do here (in the shop)."

Another special guest at the show will be Dave "Fishman" Rivera of Fishman Audio. Rivera is one of the premier audio installers in the nation, known for his ICE (in-car entertainment), and has created some of the most outrageous vehicles you've ever seen. The Fishman earned his nickname – he often installs an aquarium where the rear window was, or he'll put fish bowls (complete with live fish) where the headlights used to be.

Also entertaining at the show, the StarBoyz stunt riders will perform all kinds of crazy tricks on their sport bikes. These guys draw a huge crowd wherever they go and have put out numerous videos and DVDs showing their skills.

Carlisle Events, host of 11 collector car, truck and motorcycle events each year, attracts more than half a million people to its 82-acre fairgrounds in Carlisle, Pa., each year. Included in the annual schedule are two huge automotive swap meets – in the spring and fall – and individual specialty shows featuring Corvettes, Fords, GMs, Chryslers, trucks, motorcycles, sport compacts and imports.
