# GTR Newsletter March 2023

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In the November/December issue of the *IPMS Journal*, it featured an article of Steve Hustad's Nationals winning Friedrichshafen FF.60. It is a wonderful and impressive model and no wonder it won Best in Show. It is correctly identified as a "scratch built model". This brings me to the reason why I am writing this letter. I have always had an issue with the IPMS Nationals Best in Show winner being a scratch built model.

Our organization is the International Plastic Modelers Society, it is not the ISBMS. The difference here being Plastic vs Scratch-Built. I believe awarding the highest trophy to a scratch-built model is doing a true injustice to the members of this organization and the participants in the contest. If we are truly the International **Plastic** Modelers Society, why do we present a NON-plastic model our most prestigious award each year? The winner of the Best in Show should be made from at least 50% of a plastic model kit. I'm not against recognizing the wondrous talents of scratch-built model builders, but they need to be separate from models built from plastic kits.

I think I'm safe in saying the majority of our members build their models from plastic model kits. We need to give our best award to what the majority of our members build. Yes, the scratch builders of our hobby are extremely talented and should be recognized as such. But they are far from the majority of the IPMS. Our organization was and is today about plastic model kits. Just look at the vendor room at the Nationals. They are not selling scratch model parts; they are selling model kits. These kits are what the IPMS is based on. So the highest award at the Nationals should go to a model based on a kit. There should be a separate award for the best scratch built model. *Ed Sexton*

George had a US Mail truck that had a massive amount of plastic just for the trailer.




James brought an AMT 1960 Ford Starliner painted in Rose Gold.

This is a 1/25 scale Monogram 1987 Gambler sprint car backdated into a very early Gambler or a 1970s era Trostle with a Gambler style universal hood.

Engine in this is an MPC 1970s Pontiac V8 with the transmission cut down to fit, Monogram Corvette valve covers and the kit supplied Hilborn fuel injection system made to work. Everything has been lightly "mudded" with oil & chalk pastel nubs ground to powder and applied with a damp house-paint brush. Tires are MPC pad printed Goodyear dirt-track tires on kit supplied wheels.



Finished 1/25 scale Monogram Thunder Ranch Ferrari Daytona Spyder clone, built up from 2 partial kits leaving me parts to spare for future C3 Vette builds plus 2 extra Ferrari seats, placed on Revell Goodyear Eagle tires and AMT Enkei

wheels, and plated with an lowa Tribe registration plate.

Color scheme is Walmart Colorshots "Scuba" spray paint with a combo of Testors and Tamiya acrylic colors and a straight pin 4-speed Hurst shifter inside/Tamiya acrylic for the soft top/Uchida paint marker for the gold wheels.

# Ford GT-40 Mk. II Sebring 1966 Starfighter Decals

I used the Revell re-box of the Fujimi kit (it was the only one I had in my stash). The decals are from Starfighter and are the sixth issue they've done for Ford GT's. This sheet is their newest one and has markings for the four Ford factory entries in the 1966 Sebring race.

As little as I know about cars, I did see some glitches that I wasn't sure how to make right so took a middle-of-the-road approach and mostly glossed over what a real gearhead would do with the kit.

I have used Starfighter decals on aircraft before and they're super, but I wasn't aware that Mark Tutton, the owner, is a huge race car fan and has done so many sheets for that genre.

**Subject**: Ford Mk. II Sebring 1966 Decals **Company:** Starfighter Decals

Product #: 2412 Scale 1/24

Starfighter's latest release is their sixth Ford GT decal sheet and features the four Ford GT-40 Mk. II factory entries from the 1966 12 Hours of Sebring. The sheet's instructions state that the decals will fit on any 1/24 or 1/25 scale plastic or resin Ford GT Mk. II kit, and include PPG catalog number color callouts, plus some individual information to model each of the four cars.

I opted to use the Revell (ex-Fujimi) kit of the #98 GT-40 whose features included the "Gurney bubble" in the right door upper panel which allowed the 6'4" Gurney headroom in the car. Without a little plastic surgery to remove the bubble, that limited my choice of decals to the #2 Shelby American car or the #4 Holman-Moody one. I opted for #4.

All four Ford GT entries were painted in standard Ford factory colors....red, blue, white, and this one, painted Sauterne Gold

(PPG43433), and all had black anti-glare noses. I used Tamiya X-31 Titanium Gold to approximate the Sauterne Gold.

Each of the car numbers to be applied to the deck lid has a separate pie-shaped section used to cover the air scoop on that side. I applied the decal to the deck lid first, then when dry, glued the scoop in place and applied the filler section decal over it. That section fit precisely, settled into place with MicroSol and even covered the mounting flange for the scoop itself. A little touch up to the black circle was all it needed.

Car #4 had air extractors behind each front wheel opening. The instructions note that decals are provided for them if the builder doesn't want to cut holes in the model itself, but they didn't appear on the sheet. I made my own with some black decal trim film.

I found a photo of the #4 car showing the sponsor decals on the sheet as applied to the machine so I finished my model likewise. I didn't want to tape over the headlight and running light lens covers, so my model's probably inaccurate in that sense. If readers see other mistakes in the car's configuration, I'll accept the blame for them.

If choosing to model the #4 car, I would recommend applying the air extractor and Prototype "P" decals first, before applying the number decals to the doors. Space gets minimized there when using those plus the Autolite decals over the wheel openings.

All the decals were opaque, right on register, and conformed to all the body curves and lines well; they responded great to setting and solvent solutions.

I highly recommended this sheet, with its informative instructions and excellent quality decals. I appreciate the opportunity given me by IPMS/USA to review this sheet and enjoyed the brief trip it provided me from my normal world of aircraft to that of cars. A big thanks to Starfighter Decals and owner Mark Tutton for providing terrific decals for subjects perhaps not previously available.



# First Look: Bandai's 1/35 The Batman Batmobile



Subject: Batmobile Scale: 1/35 Manufacturer: Bandai Kit#:5062186 By Chuck Herrmann

The latest Batman movie, *The Batman*, came out in 2022. Along with the Caped Crusader himself, fans are always awaiting the latest generation of Batstuff including his cars and weapons. The model industry has usually quickly capitalized on this interest and released model kits from the films, comics and TV shows.

While this movie seems to be a commercial hit, an online search for toys and model kits shows a lack of new product. I do not know if this is due to the licensing rights or fans interest. This Bandai kit was announced rather quickly, but it is 1/35 scale so I held on waiting for a 1/24 version. A year later this has still not happened, so when I saw this one on sale on Amazon with free shipping I finally ordered it. There are no other plastic kits of this Batmobile or the latest Batcycle. So my Batmobile collection contains all the various injection molded versions.

Movie commentaries remark that this origin story shows the earlier, rough versions of Batman and his tools. Maybe that explains why this version looks nowhere near as exotic or technically advanced as other Batman movies. Batman's newest Batmobile looks like a modified 1970 Plymouth Barracuda, with a Ford Triton V10 engine added on.



This kit is 77 pieces, molded in gray/silver plastic with clear and clear red pieces. Tires are vinyl rubber. No chrome, no decals, accurate to

the real thing. Each sprue is individually wrapped, packaging is very high quality.

Even though it does not say so, at least not in English, this is a snap tite kit. There are holes and slots to snap the pieces together. That said, there is a lot of detailed engraving so the final appearance should be a good as a regular glue kit.

The design of this kit is similar to military kits in that each body piece (doors, fender, roof) is separate. So they all will need to painted and attached separately.

The instructions are a small foldout sheet. The painting directions are very vague, only calling for black, silver and dark gray. That is basically accurate for the real car, but some other variations will make for a better looking build.

My initial build steps indicate good fit and minimal mold lines. Watch for the build article in a future issue.

#### 1967 McLaren M6A Can-Am Racer



Subject: 1967 McLaren M6A – Can-Am Manufacturer: Marsh Models Scale: 1/43 By Bill Barker KS

The Series & the Car: 1967 was Year Two of the Canadian American Challenge Cup (Can-Am) Racing Series. The New Zealand- (NZ)based McLaren Racing Team had Bruce McLaren and Denis Hulme as drivers. The M6A (Real cars - Above and Photo #1) was an FIA, Group 7 race car developed by the McLaren Team and featured bodywork shaped to increase downforce and improve handling. The cars were Papaya Orange which painted became McLaren's signature color. The 1967 season ran for six rounds from September 3 to November 12. The McLaren Team won five of the six rounds with Bruce as Champion and Denny finishing second. The team won every Can-Am season championship from 1968 to 1971 and became known as the "Bruce & Denny Show."

The Kit: Of all the McLaren USRRC and Can-Am cars the '67 McLaren M6A is my favorite with its simpler design, uncomplicated aero devices and that unique dark green translucent windscreen which is a striking color next to the orange (actually papaya) finish. This 43<sup>rd</sup> kit was produced by Marsh Models, a British company that produces great 1/43<sup>rd</sup> kits which are engineered for ease of building with a chassis made of white metal, bodies and most parts made of resin with some photo-etch parts. Marsh Models has specialized in producing 50's, 60's and 70's sports racing, USRRC & Can-Am cars as well as a number of 50's, 60's and 70's endurance racers.

The Build: The build was straightforward with not much flash removal, normal cleanup including smoothing the white metal surfaces, pre-paint parts fitting and consuming a normal amount of time. This kit was probably produced in the 90s as most of the newer model cars have resin cast bodies. Still, it's a very nice kit that I would highly recommend. (My 43<sup>rd</sup> build – Photo 2)

#### The Paint and Decals:

Painting the body was the sticky wicket in this build. The so-called "Papaya" color (yellow with a strong hint of orange) is available from at least two model paint manufacturers but they don't

look close enough to this iconic color. I also tried Krylon, Rust-Oleum, etc. with no luck. A good friend of mine told me about mixing the color myself which I tried it and I think it worked well.

I also tried something new as I used my minicompressor (10-15psi. maximum) for painting all coats where I normally use this compressor for initial coats only and finish with my larger compressor. I then sprayed the rest of the parts with various shades of Alclad metalizers which gives the model more visual interest.

Then the usual sanding, starting at 6,000 grit, then 8,000 and finish with 12,000 grit. Then polish with NOVUS 2 and a final polish with Tamiya Model Wax.

I used the kit decals which were about 25 years old and a bit tinted from age. I replaced the



sponsor decals with newer ones from an aftermarket sheet but the original kit roundels and numbers were more authentic than new pure white roundels.

NOTE: There can be a problem when replicating vintage racing cars and it's best to search for period correct photos as newer photos are usually of restored cars which are often not period correct. For instance, restorations generally use larger, more complex and safer roll bars. Avon tires are also used as the original brand tires are no longer produced and six-point racing harnesses have replaced the period correct four-point harnesses, etc. Be methodical when doing your research as it's time well spent and will produce a more authentic model car.


#### AMT/Round 2

#### Media

**New British Modeling Magazine** 



The first issue of the English model magazine Car, Truck and Motorcycle World has arrived on US newsstands (Barnes and Noble). It is published by Guideline Publications. It will be published on a quarterly basis; this first issue, 70 pages in color on high quality paper, is dated Winter 2022. Retail is 6.99 Euros in Europe. At Barnes and Noble it is marked \$14.99.

Model Truck World, formerly a standalone title has been folded into this new magazine.

As you may expect the subject matter skews toward European vehicles. So you probably shouldn't expect a lot of NASCAR, drag or hot rod stuff. And a sizeable amount of the content is on diecast. There are build articles along with new product announcements, including built diecasts as well as kits and aftermarket items. Also there is coverage of 1/43 models. This issue had an almost even mix of car, motorcycle and truck articles. I found it interesting for what it covers.

We can assume that truck modelers will be a bit upset as the sharing of genres will mean less truck stuff than the dedicated truck model magazine they formerly enjoyed.

Around the turn of the millennium there was a similar British magazine. Scale Auto Modelers was published by Scale Models International, eventually part of the CONSAM group. For three years it was published monthly. It was full color and about 62 pages. The content was a similar mix of diecast and plastic, but there was very little on trucks. And more on 1/43 models. And a lot of focus on racing cars.

For three years we were able to enjoy this magazine. However, the final issue (see photo below) came out in October 2001.



The editors comments that month informed us that it was being merged with another of the publishers titles, *Scale Models*. This was a magazine that had long covered military modeling, but would in the future all types of modeling, including vehicles.

If this sounds more than a bit familiar to US modelers, remember *Scale Auto Enthusiast*? In October 2020 subscribers were informed by the publisher Kalmbach that it would no longer be published and the content would be folded into their sister publication, the all interest *Fine Scale Modeler*. Well the automotive models content went from a whole magazine to maybe one or two articles each issue. I let my *Fine Scale* subscription lapse.



There has been enough said on that topic, hopefully *Car, Truck and Motorcycle World* can continue in its present format for a long time. There are still a lot of military mode magazines on the bookstore shelves, hopefully this one for car modelers survives.
